Tutoring – The Vision of School as a Community

"The changes that I find highly valuable are the ones achieved with regard to the children's motivation and attitude towards the school. The children who had been reluctant to even talk about school for various justifiable reasons not only improved their school performance but also started perceiving school differently, as something of their own."



There aren't two schooling experiences that are identical and each school is a constantly changing universe unto itself. Families and children face challenges on a daily basis in their pursuit of success at school, as well as in trying to fit in the school's context as a part of the child's broader social integration. The authors of the <u>Tutoring Model</u> of inclusive education are of the opinion that the gap between school and the community opens when the reasons for learning and social integration difficulties are looked for primarily within parents and children, instead of in the community itself.
